ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2020-21 FROM THE CHAIR OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

YOUR PARISH COUNCIL

All our regular parish council meetings from 7 May 2020 to 6 May 2021 have been held remotely; the statutory Annual Parish Meeting, and the Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council, were postponed for up to 12 months. Following official advice, these two meetings are being held in the Village Hall at 6.00pm on Thursday 27 May 2021.

We express our sincere thanks and warmest wishes to Gerda Southwell and Anthea Carter, who retired from the Parish Council in 2020. We thank Gerda for her long-standing, loyal and thoughtful service, and Anthea for her transformative contributions to the village website and the Melling Chronicle, for which she will continue to work as editor.

At our meeting on 10 December 2020, we were pleased to welcome and elect two new councillors, Jo Bayes and Patrick Holmes.

OUR VILLAGE HALL

We are pleased to note the re-opening of the Village Hall, and we thank the Melling Institute Management Committee, including councillor Sandra Towers, for making the Village Hall ready to host meetings in accordance with Covid-19 safety requirements.

THE MELLING CHRONICLE

We wish to thank editor Anthea Carter for another year's sterling work in producing an attractive and readable parish magazine, and the team of volunteer distributors, for helping to keep us in touch with one another during the pandemic. We also thank the advertisers in the Chronicle for their continuing support.

ST WILFRID'S SCHOOL

We congratulate all at St Wilfrid's School for all they have done, in difficult circumstances to ensure continuity of education for local children, and we wish them success in seeking funding for improvements to the school community playground.

ST WILFRID'S CHURCH

We are conscious of the loss to our community of the prolonged periods of closure of the church or restrictions on numbers at services. We hope that the new West door, for which the Parish Council was able to contribute to the cost, will be a harbinger of better times to come.

VILLAGE LENGTHSMAN

We wish to thank Paul Williams, our contracted Lengthsman, for his work on open spaces in our parish, particularly in respect of extensive digging out of gullies on either side of the A683 at Bell's Corner.

WRAYTON FLOODING

The Parish Council has repeatedly pressed Lancashire Highways to include in their budget work to remedy the problem of flooding on the roadway in Back Lane, Wrayton, which has been exacerbated in recent years by extreme rainfall events.

Also in Wrayton, where long-term serious erosion of the banks of the Greta river has encroached on three gardens in Back Lane, an on-site meeting was held with Tim Pitt, the manager of the Lune Rivers Trust, and three parish councillors. Advice was given on possible sources of funding for a feasibility study of ways to tackle the problem.

MELLING GREEN

The Parish Council is in the process of reviewing its management of Melling Green, taking advice from residents and local organisations. The Parish Council would be glad to hear from anyone who may be interested in being part of an open group of residents who could meet to pool their ideas and suggestions.Continued

COUNCILS AGAINST NOISE AND SPEED (CANS)

The Parish Council is represented by councillor Howard Lower on this Action Group, which has been campaigning effectively to reduce speeding and other problems caused by motorcycles in the Lune Valley, North Yorkshire and South Lakes. In May and June, parts of the A683 between Caton and Wrayton Lane End will be fitted with solar powered road studs, as a first step towards the eventual installation of average speed cameras. In addition, spot checks are proposed on the mechanical safety of vehicles, and the use of silencers.

‘EVENTS, DEAR BOY...’

Monday 11 January 2021: a Stagecoach bus demolishes part of the wall at Gillison Close containing Melling’s post box. By 22 February, thanks to the diligence of our Parish Clerk, and the cooperation of the owner of 10 Gillison Close, the wall had been rebuilt and the post box reinstated.

Tuesday 6 April 2021: an articulated lorry demolishes most of the bus shelter at Wrayton Lane End. Within days, a task force of Wrayton residents had removed the debris to John E Clarke’s farmyard, and enquiries began to choose a local builder to rebuild the shelter as before. It is hoped that the shelter will be ready for use by September.



With goodwill and co-operation, much can be achieved!

In conclusion, I wish to thank all Parish Councillors, old and new, for each playing their part constructively and with good humour in tackling the various issues that face us. Last but not least, I know I speak for us all in thanking Claire Helme, who joined us as Parish Clerk on 1 November 2020, for her commitment and contribution to the effective functioning of Melling-with-Wrayton Parish Council.

COVID ROADMAP - 21ST JUNE 2021

SOCIAL CARE - Care home residents will no longer need to isolate for 14 days after visits outside, except after overnight hospital stays and visits classed as high risk by the care home.

RESIDENTIAL VISITS - Out-of-school groups, such as Brownies, Scouts and Duke of Edinburgh, will now be able to have overnight trips in groups of up to 30 children.

RISK ASSESSMENT - For weddings, civil partnership ceremonies and commemorative events of more than 30 people, the venue manager or organiser must complete a risk assessment beforehand.

WAKES - In England, commemorative events can be attended by as many people as social distancing allows at the venue to minimise Covid risks. A risk assessment may need to be completed.

WEDDINGS - In England, weddings and civil partnership ceremonies events can be attended by as many people as social distancing allows at the venue, to minimise the risk of COVID-19. A risk assessment may need to be completed.

THE FAIRBANK SOCIETY



COOKING CORNER...

PIRI-PIRI CHICKEN WITH SMASHED SWEET POTATOES & BROCCOLI

INGREDIENTS

- 3 large sweet potatoes (about 900g), peeled and cut into large chunks
- oil, for drizzling
- 6-8 chicken thighs, skin left on
- 2 red onions, cut into wedges
- 25g sachet piri-piri spice mix (or a mild version, if you like)
- 300g long-stem broccoli



METHOD

1. Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4.
2. Toss the sweet potatoes with a generous drizzle of oil and some seasoning, and tip into a very large roasting tin.
3. Push the potatoes to one end of the tin, then, in the other end, toss the chicken with the onions, spice mix, a drizzle of oil and some seasoning.
4. Roast for 40 mins (if the thighs have a bone in, 35 mins if they are boneless), stirring everything halfway through.
5. Add the broccoli to the tin, drizzle with a little oil and season and then roast for 10-15 mins more.
6. Remove the chicken, onions and broccoli from the tin.
7. Roughly mash the potatoes using a fork, making sure you incorporate all the chicken juices and spices from the pan.
8. Spread the mash over the base of the tin, then top with the broccoli, chicken and onions and serve from the tin in the middle of the table.

Serves 3 or 2 adults & 2 children you could “pad it out” by roasting some sweetcorn cobs to serve with it.

THURSDAY GROUP ... DISBANDED

1	1838	British scientist Charles Darwin presented a paper to the Linnean Society in London, on his theory of the evolution of species and natural selection.
2	1644	Parliamentarian forces defeated Prince Rupert at the Battle of Marston Moor, their first victory over the Royalists in the English Civil War.
3	1996	It was confirmed that the Stone of Scone, the symbol of the Scottish nation taken by Edward I of England in 1296, was to be returned to Scotland from Westminster Abbey where it has been used in the coronation of 30 British monarchs.
4	1776	Congress accepted the Declaration of Independence written by Thomas Jefferson, formally ending American links with Britain.
5	1791	George Hammond was appointed the first British Ambassador to the USA.
6	1535	Former favourite of King Henry VIII Sir Thomas More was executed after refusing to recognise the King as the head of the Church.
7	1307	English King Edward I, conqueror of Wales and “Hammer of the Scots” dies on the way to Scotland to fight Robert the Bruce.
8	1822	Leading romantic poet Percy Bysshe Shelley drowned in the Bay of Spezia, when his boat sunk in a storm.

12	1910	British pilot Charles Stewart Rolls, 33, died after his French built biplane crashed at a flying competition in Bournemouth, Dorset. He was a partner in the Rolls-Royce car manufacturing company.
13	1923	The British parliament passes a law banning the sale of alcohol to under-18’s.
14	1858	Birthday of Emmeline Pankhurst, English suffragette who suffered imprisonment in order to gain the vote for women.
15	1857	200 British men, women and children are chopped up by local butchers and thrown down a well at Cawnpore, as the Indian Mutiny continues.
